The History of Mesoamerica: Ancient Empires and Indigenous Legends

The theme for the 31st Mi Pueblo Camp is "Ancient Civilizations" of Central America, as we celebrate our 31st year of Mi Pueblo exploration.

The Camp Welcome Center opens at 9:00 am on Monday morning, June 19th, and everyone must be at Camp by 9:15 a.m. so that Camp can begin promptly at 9:30 a.m.

After our traditional opening ceremony, Campers will begin to explore the ancient empires and indigenous legends of Latin America.

The week is full of special activities and wonderful classes in Spanish, Culture, Games, Music, dance and Art (Crafts). And this is the second year of our exciting and expanding Teen Program, with 24 teens now registered!

On Friday evening starting at 6:30 p.m. (all Campers and volunteers

need to be back at Camp by 6 p.m.) we will gather for our traditional evening Fiesta at Forest Hill Church.

Of course, Mi Pueblo can't get started without being set up---we have very limited time to put all in place for Monday morning. Homerooms and classrooms need to be set up and decorated. The supplies and food must be unloaded and put in place. Signs and maps must be posted.

So PLEASE come and help---the more volunteers ---the faster we can be finished. Come for at least an hour or more on **Saturday**, **June 17**th from 9 a.m. to 12 Noon, and on **Sunday**, **June 18**th from 12 noon to 2 p.m. Children are welcome. New families can see the Camp facilities. Teens have a chance to show their dedication to keeping Mi Pueblo alive.

Then we will have our annual **Volunteer Orientation** once again at **Embassy Suites Hotel at 6 p.m.** until about 7:30 p.m. We'll have a pizza party, with cookies and beverages. Campers can meet their counselors and everyone can learn about the week's activities.

Be sure to read the separate **Instructions** for EVERYONE coming to Camp. Remember that ALL volunteers must read and sign the Volunteer Form, and either mail or hand-in at Camp.

We need lots of help to clean up the Church AFTER Camp Friday afternoon, AND after the Fiesta on Friday evening. Please help.

Finally, you can also help by donating items and baskets to, and participating in, the Fiesta raffle and silent auction to raise funds for *Mi Pueblo*. This has always been the Camp's largest (and only) fundraiser of the year.

Key Facts About Mi Pueblo Culture Camp '23

Mi Pueblo - Means "My People, My Village or My Nation."

Camp Location: Forest Hill Presbyterian Church, 3031 Monticello Blvd. (corner of Monticello Blvd. and Lee Rd.), Cleveland Hts., OH (Mi Pueblo has rented the Church's facilities for 28 years.)

Dates: Monday through Friday, June 19 - 23, 2023.

Times: 9:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. (early dismissal on Friday at 3:00 p.m.) Campers and Volunteers must be at Camp by 9:15 a.m. each day to be ready to start Camp on time

Friday Night Fiesta: June 23rd - 6:30 - 10 p.m. at Forest Hill Church. Campers and volunteers must be back at the Church by 6:00 p.m.

Camp Homerooms -

Child Care - There is no day or childcare for infants/toddlers up to age 2. An adult must be responsible for any infant/toddler not in the Preschool at Camp. There will be space in the Crib Room for infants/toddlers not in Preschool.

Preschool - See instructions accompanying this newsletter for Campers ages 2 and 3. The Preschool will have a limited number of classes and will follow their own schedule as determined by the Coordinator and counselors, and as needed by the children.

Homerooms - Grades K-1, Grades 2-3, Grades 4-5-6, Grades 7-8 and Volunteers in Training (VITs) attend all classes (i.e. games, crafts, Spanish, music, dance and culture).

Teen Program: Teens registered for this program will have daily activities, volunteer time, and social time. They will be going off-site on Tuesday to the award-winning Pivot Center, 2937 West 25th Street, in Cleveland (http://www.pivotartcenter.com/) for an art activity with Future Ink Graphics (FIG).

First Day of Camp - Getting Ready for the Fun!

THINGS TO KNOW:

Dress: Camp T-shirts will be provided on the first day to EVERYONE at Camp. T-shirts MUST be worn by ALL every day at Camp. There is no air conditioning, so all Campers and volunteers should dress casually and cool. Campers play games and have some classes outside so appropriate footwear must be worn. NO FLIP FLOPS ALLOWED.

Food: Morning or afternoon snack, a Latin American lunch, and beverages will be provided for ALL Campers, Childcare children, Senior Campers, volunteers and teachers. Bring a lunch for you and/or your child(ren) ONLY if there are special needs. There are always several vegetarian options each day. But this year we will NOT be able to accommodate other special dietary restrictions or needs.

THINGS TO BRING TO CAMP:

Fans: Bring a fan(s), and put your name on your fan(s) and drop it/them off at the Camp Office.

Sneakers/tennis shoes: ALL Campers, including Senior Campers AND Teens, must either wear sneakers or tennis shoes, or closed-toed/heeled Keens or similar every day, OR bring them on Monday -- labeled, in a plastic bag--and leave them in the homeroom at the end of each day. NO FLIP FLOPS OR CROCS WITHOUT BACKS!!

Cloth bag or carrier - Bring or buy a bag at Camp for your Camper to carry home daily gifts, dirty clothes, etc. Water bottle - Campers may bring these, but please label CLEARLY with Camper's name.

Donation Items - are needed for the Fiesta raffle and silent auction.

Also, please remember that our kitchen staff are all volunteers, and they prepare a daily Latin American lunch. We try to accommodate most special needs, and vegetarian options are available. But we cannot accommodate all special dietary requests. Families and volunteers are welcome and encouraged to check recipes for potential allergies.

Mi Pueblo is operated entirely by volunteers. We gather each year just for this one special week, and because many families and volunteers come from outside the area, we have little time for training or working out problems that naturally arise in any large group. That is why we have developed various rules, and why we require all volunteers to sign a Volunteer Agreement. We are always tweaking how we manage the Camp, and your input is critical. While we cannot please everyone all of the time, we do strive to listen to everyone's comments and concerns.

YOU are Mi Pueblo, and there is no Camp without all of us working together!
